Time will be allotted to reviewing key texts and concepts from **Ferguson's *Mapping the Social Landscape*, 9th edition** and those that are central to the study of sociology more broadly, to becoming familiar with resources for your SU SOC 101 course sections, to reviewing course syllabus requirements and design, etc.
